2. VENUE

Whiteface Mountain will host the Alpine Skiing events of the Lake Placid 2019 International Children's Games. Situated in upstate New York in the town of Wilmington, Whiteface hosts many national and international events annually and was the site of the 1932 and 1980 Olympic Games.

3. EVENTS AND QUOTAS

- Giant Slalom, boys – Each city may enter a maximum of 3 boys;
- Giant Slalom, girls – Each city may enter a maximum of 3 girls;
- Parallel Slalom, Mixed Team (Each team ideally consists of 2 boys and 2 girls from different delegations. There is at least one female competitor in each team.) – Each city may enter a maximum of 3 boys and 3 girls. The teams will be mixed by gender and cities and will be chosen by a random algorithm.

5. COMPETITION REGULATION

5.1 Giant slalom

- The Giant Slalom will be decided by two runs. All competitors that finished the first run will be qualified for the second run. The right is reserved to decide that only the top 30 competitors from the first run will qualify for the second run if the length of the race does not allow a start of all competitors in both runs. The starting order of the top 30 competitors for the second run is determined by the result of the first run in inverted order (the 30th in the result list starts 1st, the 29th in the result list starts 2nd, etc.).

- Athletes outside the top 30 will start in ascending order according to the result of the first run (the 31st in the result list starts 31st, the 32nd in the result list starts 32nd etc.).
- To secure equal competition conditions for all delegations the starting order is conducted in three groups. Each athlete from a delegation will be allocated to in a different group.

5.2 Parallel slalom

- The Parallel Slalom Mixed Team is conducted as a parallel event using giant slalom gates and panels.
- The team size is limited to a maximum of 4 competitors. Each team ideally consists of 2 boys and 2 girls from different delegations. There is at least one female competitor in each team.
- The maximum number of teams allowed is 35. If 16 teams or more are registered, a qualification round will be conducted to determine the final 16 teams. The ranking is determined by the combined time of the two fastest times per team.
- The qualified teams will be seeded into heats based on their ranking (heat 1: team ranked 1 vs team ranked 16 (last). The best team, according to the qualification, starts first and the last nation, according to the qualification will start last.
- Each individual leg between two opponents consists of one run. The start order will be as follows (as an example for Heat 1):
 - “Red Course” Team 1 – athlete 1 against “Blue Course” Team 16 – athlete 1
 - “Red Course” Team 1 – athlete 2 against “Blue Course” Team 16 – athlete 2
 - “Blue Course” Team 1 – athlete 1 against “Red Course” Team 16 – athlete 1
 - “Blue Course” Team 1 – athlete 2 against “Red Course” Team 16 – athlete 2
- The winner of each individual leg scores 1 point for his team. In case of a tie of an individual leg, both teams are awarded 1 point.
- If there is a tie at the end of the heat (2:2) the team with the lowest combined time of the two fastest times will win the heat.
- If both competitors fall in any leg, the first competitor to reach the finish successfully will be the winner. If both competitors fail to finish, the competitor who successfully skied the furthest distance will be the leg winner.
- In addition to the final the losers of the semi-final will compete against each other for places 3 and 4

6. EQUIPMENT

Helmets are mandatory for all FIS ski events during inspection, training and competition. FIS approved helmets manufactured for ski racing or helmets that meet appropriate standards such as the European Standard (CEE 1077:2007) or the US Standard 2040 (ASTM 2040) are required. It is also strongly recommended that competitors consider using back protection.

7. DISPUTES

Any disputes will be resolved in compliance with FIS rules and the clauses included in the ICG Sports Rules.
